How have we been able to achieve what we have in such a small amount of time?

When building a club or a team I have always stuck to 4 simple Pillars.

People:

Getting the right people involved that represent our values and standards is crucial – we are very lucky to have some wonderful people involved with Kaipaki. Many friends have been created and developed over the last 3 years.

If you get these 4 Pillars right then you have the makings of a sustainable club. We've tried to develop something that people can be proud of. I think we've achieved this and already people are looking forward to next season. Once a few more seasons pass then the stories that we have already developed will be the stuff of legend in the future. We may not know it but everyone in this room is creating Kaipaki history at the moment and we may not appreciate what we are achieving until our kids start playing for the Baggy Green & Golds.

Although there are many things that are good about Kaipaki there are many things we can enhance. Next year I would like to create more local community involvement. To do this I'd like to see a quadrangular junior cricket competition between Ohaupo, Kaipaki, Ngahinapouri and Patarangi Primary Schools. Junior cricket will help our sustainability. I would also like to create a competition called the Kaipaki Cricket Classic – which will be a 20/20 competition played amongst 4 teams that are made up of 75% locals.

At the moment there seems to be a little resentment towards Kaipaki Cricket especially within Waikato Valley. This is to be expected as over a short period of time we have achieved a lot and the tall poppy mentality of people kicks in. I don't think we should be embarrassed by what we have achieved but we should be humble. I would like to think that other clubs follow our lead and try and lift their own standards - this will ultimately be good for country cricket as a whole.
